Research and Innovation



EU R&D Policy – future Horizon 2020	ESIF
Differences	
Non-territorial approach based solely on excellence	Place-based approach supporting economic and social cohesion
Mainly individual R&D Projects tackling the whole cycle of innovation, although some programme co-funding in domain of partnering (ERA-NETs, etc.)	<b>Multiannual Programmes</b> largely focused on capacity building and close(r) to the market R&D and innovation support
<b>Centrally managed</b> (DG RTD) and <b>awarded directly</b> <b>to final beneficiaries</b> (public and private R&D centres, universities or research funding organisations)	<b>Shared management</b> with national and regional public intermediaries (managing authorities and implementing agencies) which allocate funding to final beneficiaries
<b>Competitive calls for proposals</b> addressed to international groupings (European Research Council and Marie Skłodowska-Curie also address individuals) <b>through peer-review based on excellence criteria</b>	<b>Frequent use of competitive attribution</b> but flexibility for more policy-related prioritisation based on cohesion considerations
Complementarities	
<b>Horizon 2020</b> will focus on tackling major societal challenges, maximising the competitiveness impact of research and innovation and raising and spreading levels of excellence.	<b>Cohesion policy</b> will act as a capacity building instrument via smart specialisation in regions and Member States. Staircase to Excellence = increasing capacity to participate in Horizon 2020.



# So, how to optimise complementarity and synergies?

- Develop and implement Smart Specialisation Strategies
- Thematic concentration: R&I, SME, low carbon economy, ICT.
- Practical coordination & synergy: <u>combined</u> <u>funding</u> (but not same cost item); <u>harmonisation</u> <u>of cost rules</u>; <u>investment outside region covered</u> <u>by Operational Programme</u>; and <u>enhanced</u> <u>territorial cooperation</u> building on Regions of Knowledge and Research Potential.
- Closing the innovation divide under Horizon 2020
